


Jonah Chapter 4

Do You Do Well to Be Angry?





"Do you do well to be angry?"

Jonah went out of the city and sat to the east of the city and made a booth for himself there. He sat under it in the shade, till he should see what would become of the city. Now the LORD God appointed a plant and made it come up over Jonah, that it might be a shade over his head, to save him from his discomfort. So Jonah was exceedingly glad because of the plant. God reconciled people to Himself in that He did not hold their sins against them. And this is the ministry of reconciliation that we have been given.






Withholding Grace Because People are **Broken** is Backwards. The Brokenness is the Very Reason We Show Grace.


