
A Prepared Response Mark 14:1-11







Contrast: Three Responses

1. The Preservation of Religion and Influence

1. The Potential of Personal Gain and Money

1. The Pouring Out of All Potential for Personal Gain, with No Thought to Preserving Her Reputation, So That Her Influence Was the Fragrance of Extravagant Love.

But in every case, whether for gifts, or for pleasure, or for sacred uses of consecration or burial, it was not the intrinsic value of the ointment, but the thought which went with it, that gave it significance. It represented deep heart feeling, loyalty; deep religious consecration; sorrow and hope.

Complaint: You Might Be Criticized

1. Extravagance is the only reasonable reasonable

1. Not a dismissal of the poor, acknowledgment of her perfect timing

1. Nothing is Wasted in the presence of the Lord.

Commendation: Stop Bothering Her



A command to immediately cease what they were doing.


Commendation: Three Reasons
